

Alice is good at Maths and so is she good at languages.




Jack has done his assignments and so has he finished work.

Somsak can


swim.

TO SHOW CONTRAST 'In spite of the fact that... Despite of the fact that...'

In spite of the fact that she is beautiful, May has no boyfriend. Despite of the fact that Tom makes an efforts, he could not pass the exam.

In spite of the fact that I am sick, I will drink cold drink.



TO SHOW CONTRAST 'but, while, whereas..'

Janie drinks milk every morning, but her sister doesn't.

Tigers have stripy fur whereas leopards have spots.



While he may be rich, he certainly isn't handsome.



TO SHOW CONTRAST 'nevertheless, however, still , yet on the contrary, on the other hand'

The tornado destroyed the entire town. However, no one was killed. Tom said his English is terrible. Nevertheless, he got a perfect score on his English test.



Joseph said that his father is rich. Still, he should get a job and learn to be responsible with money.

TO SHOW CONTRAST however + adj. + clause

Polite as he's said to be, he cursed at me for five minutes!
